## Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility.



- Our staff, SGC members and regular volunteers all hold valid UK/Local DBS Checks.
   Visitors without the appropriate checks will not be allowed unsupervised access to the premesis.
- Please ensure you are never alone with a child in an enclosed space.
- Photographs and video footage must not be taken without prior agreement and parental consent.
- Please do not take confidential information off site without prior agreement from parents or the EYFS Leader.
- Please avoid physical contact with the children e.g. hugging or sitting children on your knee.
- Please be a good role model to our pupils by being respectful, fair and considerate of others.
- Report to staff any unacceptable behaviour.
- All visitors must sign in and out and reception.

## What to do if a child makes a

- Stay calm and reassuring.
- Explain that you cannot promise to keep what the child tells you a secret-you may have to contact a social worker or the police.
- Don't make any other promises to the child-the situation may cause you to react emotionally
- Don't make any other promises to the child-the situation may cause you to react emotionally.
- Listen and reassure.
- Do not press for details or ask leading questions—this is likely to need further and possibly extensive investigation. It is better for the child if s/he does not have to repeat the details unnecessarily. This could also compromise a potential criminal investigation.





- Tell the child that s/he was right to tell-that s/he is not to blame for the incident.
- Let the child know that you understand how difficult it is to talk about such experiences
   Thank the child
- As soon as possible afterwards, record you conversation with the child. Remember the child's exact words. Record your own statements to the child.
- Refer to the school's Designated
   Safeguarding Lead as soon as possible

If you feel that a child may be at risk of harm but are not sure, then inform one of the safeguarding team immediately.
